



Mike Doran was appointed Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Support to Public Diplomacy in April 2007. He is responsible for advising the Department's senior leadership on policy to support public diplomacy and strategic communication, and for advocating key themes and messages to promote U.S. national security interests.

Prior to joining the Department of Defense, Dr. Doran served as Senior Director for Near East and North African Affairs at the National Security Council. His portfolio covered all of the countries in the region except for Iraq.

Prior to coming to the NSC, Dr. Doran was a professor in the Department of Near Eastern Studies at Princeton University, where he taught courses on the international politics of the Middle East. From 2002 to 2004 he also served as an Adjunct Senior Fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations in New York. Prior to arriving at Princeton, Dr. Doran taught in the History Department at the University of Central Florida.

Following September 11, Mike Doran conducted extensive research on terrorist use of the internet. This research informed an influential article he authored on Osama bin Laden titled "Somebody Else's Civil War," which was published in the January/February 2002 issue of *Foreign Affairs*. It also informed an article on Saudi Arabia titled "The Saudi Paradox" in the January/February 2004 issue of *Foreign Affairs*, and a *Washington Post* Op-Ed called "Intimate Enemies" on the depth of the Sunni-Shiite conflict in the Middle East.

Originally from Indiana, Dr. Doran received a BA from Stanford in 1987 and a PhD from Princeton in 1997.
